

### Six New Records!

St. Mary's Hope Adebogun broke the Midget Girls High Jump record with a jump of 1.34m, topping 1.33m from 1997. Junior Girls Long Jump winner was Reyzel Aquino of Sacred Heart with 4.89m, topping 2012's record of 4.83m. The Junior Girls Shot Put record was set by Rachel Vanderhooft of St. Gabriel with a throw of 10.87m, beating 1986's 10.75m. Juleah Duesing of St. Gabriel set a new standard of 12.73 seconds in Senior Girls 100m, beating 12.80 seconds from 1977. Kailee Woitas of St. Marguerite broke the Senior Girls Long Jump record with a jump of 5.01m. The previous record of 4.83m was set in 2002. St. Gabriel's Senior Girls 4x100m relay team set a new mark of 53.39 seconds, passing the previous mark of 53.77 seconds which was set in 2000.







## **Speedy Racer**


