September has been an eventful month for staff in Regina Catholic School Division, in fact in any school across Canada. The jostle and flurry of beginning a new cycle of learning and growing is always exciting for our chosen vocation – caring, loving and teaching God's children as we prepare them in faith and knowledge for their futures. The 2017-2018 school year is shaping up to be another success.

Some of the most powerful moments of the month were the solemn blessings and grand openings of our three new schools. Each of the six events were unique and well planned, performed smoothly and reflective of the Gospel values of Regina Catholic Schools. Despite holding three of each of the blessings and openings, each was distinctive and carried its own personal message of the saint for which they were named. St. Kateri Tekakwitha School opened alongside their public school neighbours, and kicked off the show for all the Regina schools. At École St. Elizabeth, the community was largely already established, and after mapping the way within the new facility, the atmosphere has settled into a familiar feel. St. Nicholas School, meanwhile, chose to begin the year with St. Nicholas in mind, with giving and sharing their gifts as a priority. Archbishop Donald Bolen led a liturgy at each school, blessing each community, every cross in the building, and all individual rooms in the new schools. His homilies each explored the namesake of the schools, giving students his perspective of St. Kateri, St. Elizabeth, and St. Nicholas.

As a division, we have decided to commemorate Orange Shirt Day on October 2nd as September 30th fell on a Saturday. Once again, our staff and students joined in solidarity to remember and support our Indigenous sisters and brothers who were denied their identity, rights and freedoms in residential schools. Schools all across Regina held Terry Fox events to raise awareness and money for cancer research.

As we begin the month of Thanksgiving, I trust the message of our commitment to reconciliation the Archbishop delivered to us at our Opening Mass will stay with us all. May each paper turkey replica and artistic representation be created with the love of Christ and the sense of welcome and belonging that was the intent of Thanksgiving Day. We all have much for which to be thankful.


St. Elizabeth Opening

The Social Justice group at St. Josaphat had a busy 2016-2017 year leading school-wide initiatives and assemblies to raise awareness about important social issues. They have worked hard to partner with several local organizations and address issues surrounding food insecurity in their community. Throughout the year they organized school wide food drives through the FCC Hunger program for the Regina Food Bank; the Social Justice Team also collected food for hampers



over the winter. One of the most memorable moments for educator Jaylene Brass was their volunteer trip to Souls Harbour Rescue Mission. Thirteen members of the group spent three hours helping out with the Mission's staff.

For Vice-Principal Jaylene Brass, it was a special trip as she saw the students' excitement when they could see their hard work making an impact on people's lives. Through these experiences she could see a passion developing in her students to become activists and take on more leadership roles; as a result Jaylene is excited to find more ways to incorporate volunteer opportunities into the Social Justice group's programming. For their global initiative, the students took the lead on researching a variety of organizations that they could support. This research process was a great experience for the students as it encouraged them to learn about a variety of social justice issues that organizations are addressing. In the end the students decided to support the Lucky Iron Fish, an organization which looks to address the fact that 1/3 of the world's population is iron deficient. This health project resonated with students as it showed how small innovative modifications and tools can have a big impact in people's lives.

After a successful first year with the WE School program the Social Justice team is looking forward to getting futher involved in how they can make positive changes locally and globally.
