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New Director of Education Domenic Scuglia

was selected along with 32 other administrators from across Canada. In 2009, he opened a new school – St. Maximilian Kolbe Catholic High School and organised a pilgrimage to Poland to follow in the school's namesake place of birth and eventual death at Auschwitz. As a result of that experience, he introduced a summer credit program for students to study genocide using the Holocaust as the focus for understanding society's role from preventing these types of events from occurring in the future. The course is called 'We Are Witness.' He is hoping to build acceptance in Saskatchewan for the programme.

Domenic is a strong believer in providing opportunities for success for all students in all pathways grounded in Gospel values. As a school system, he believes that we have a critical role to play to provide educational opportunities

so that each child is included and has a place to learn according to their learning style. He feels we also need to support our staff and students on their journey of faith.

Sport is a passion for Domenic with a special love of rugby, and he has many rugby related accolades attached to his name, including seven years as the head coach of the York University Men's Varsity Rugby Team, two years as the President of Rugby Ontario, and the York Region Athletic Association's Pete Beach Award in 2011.

Domenic and his wife Kim have three children Allie, Andrew and Adam all of whom are incredibly supportive of his new role and move to Regina Catholic School Division. Domenic is very much looking forward to joining the Regina Catholic School Division family.

Planning Ahead

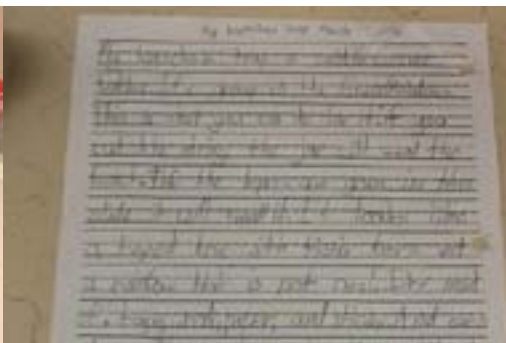

Rockin' Mustangs

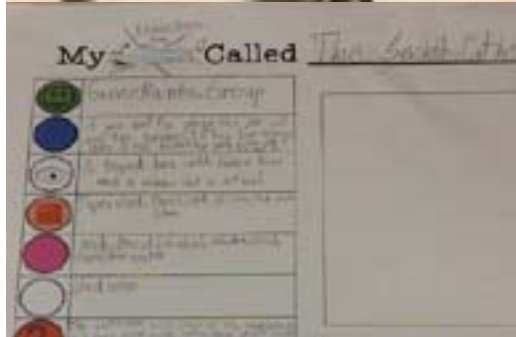

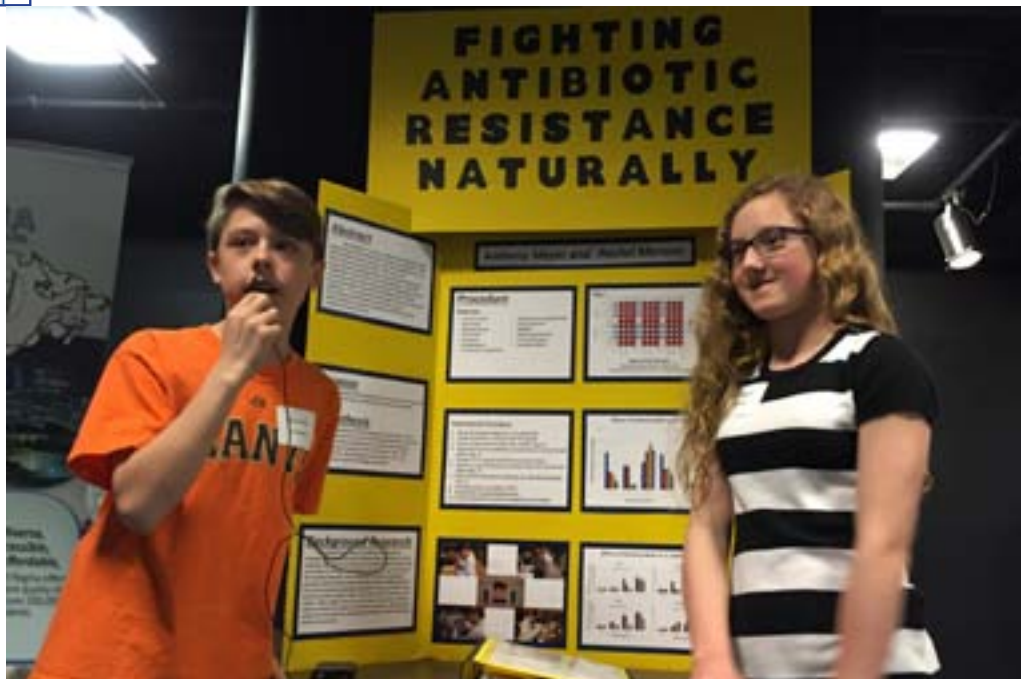
Elementary Robotics
