# **Creating a Listening & Learning Classroom Environment**

#### **Tips from the RCSD Speech and Language Department**

Did you know that the average grade 1 student does not understand 1 in 6 words spoken by their teacher, due to excessive background noise and poor classroom acoustics? (SAC, 2018). Not only does classroom noise affect the teacher's vocal health, but this may also lead to student's poor understanding, decreased attention, reduced performance, reading difficulty, decreased motivation and even delayed language acquisition. Help your students learn to the best of their ability by trying some of these easy classroom noise-reduction tips:

- Place tables/desks on an angle (instead of in rows) which keeps sounds from bouncing around the room.
- Turn off noisy equipment when it is not in use.
- When possible, try to keep windows and doors closed.
- Try to avoid providing instructions/lessons to one part of the classroom while other students are listening to music or playing on the computer. Instead, encourage students to read/work silently in their respective spots as instructions are given to the other students.
- As tennis balls are made of latex, and can be prone to the growth of mold, opt for latex-free soft tips at the bottom of chairs and tables.
- Replace noisy or flickering fluorescent light fixtures right away, as this can be very distracting for students.
- Consider adding a hypoallergenic area rug or a washable material (i.e. interlocking tiles) in part of the classroom (i.e. in the teacher's common walking path).
- Consider using a Personal Frequency Modulation System (FM system) when instructing or providing directions. Not only will this reduce the vocal strain for teachers, but it will improve the audibility of the teacher's voice over the background noise. Keep in mind that FM systems do not reduce the background noise therefore; soundfield amplification is not a solution for classroom noise problems!
