Joanna Landry is a registered member of Cowessess First Nation and has strong Métis family roots connected to the Crooked Lake Métis road allowance settlement. She is a product of Regina Catholic schools where she attended various schools from Kindergarten-Grade 12 within the division. She began her rewarding career as a teacher with Regina Catholic Schools in 1995 and later becoming the Aboriginal Education Consultant and most recently the First Nations, Inuit & Métis Education Coordinator. Joanna's role as a coordinator supports a wide variety of school division areas such as Ministry reporting, strategic leads, planning support, project curriculum implementation and support, knowledge

of resources and collaborative planning.

Her strengths are working with First Nations and Métis Elders, but her passion includes Catholic Education, being a Treaty education leader since its inception in 2000, supporting First Nations, Inuit & Métis student learning and achievement, and First Nations knowledge and philosophies. Joanna credits her traditional knowledge from the many First Nations and Métis Elders and knowledge keepers she has been honored to work with across Saskatchewan. After 5 years of leadership at central office she applied for the FNMI Coordinator position. She held that position for the last 17 years after which time she decided to recently apply for a superintendent's position and was successful there as well. Joanna Landry's work has and continues to be a great blessing for the Catholic school system and for the local and national church, especially so at a time when strengthening relations and healing past wounds with our Indigenous peoples are an urgent priority. Everything Joanna undertakes, she does with much care and concern. She's an amazing listener and does not speak too quickly; she weighs her words after hearing what others have to say. Donna has been a member of the board of trustees for Regina Catholic Schools (RCSD) for a period of 19 years. Donna has been a board member since the 2000 election and was the only woman on the board for that term. As Rob Bresciani's sister-in-law, he got tired of Donna asking him questions about facilities, transportation and staffing, and finally said, 'just run for the damn board instead of asking me'. During this tenure, Donna has led and been party of many initiatives. The following is a list of ways she has demonstrated her leadership:

- 2005-2011: RCSD director for SCSBA, deputy chair 2 years
- 2017-2018: SSBA Member of the Education Governance Organizational Review Committee



Founding member on a few initiatives:

2004: Inquiry into student representation/consultation with the board - Youth Senates were established by 2005-2006 and continued until 2017.

2006: One of the founding members and volunteers for the Breakfast for Learning Committee through the SSBA, then known as the Saskatchewan Nutrition Advisory Council for Kids - now the ongoing nutrition program recognized by the SSBA (still involved in the selection process committee.)

2007-2008: One of the founding supporters/members for the Circle of Voices Committee Instrumental in RCSD having its first youth day in 2006 - November 20 and having this day declared by the Mayor as RCSD Youth Day, it had 16 breakout sessions, 1 key note. Over 1000 students attended.

RCSD director for SCSBA responsibilities included being a member of the executive and on the communications committee, helped organize two Affirming Hope joint conferences with the Catholic Health Association of Saskatchewan (2006, 2011 - co-chaired as host with Bert Yakichuk). Presented our Catholic history at the 2006 Affirming Hope Conference. Present when Theodore started, mill rates were decided, during the development of new schools' admission policy by Catholic boards, when government coined terms as Schools^{Plus}, and the amalgamation of 14 boards to 8 boards.

Donna has been an active trustee on several committees: Finance Committee, Policy Committee, Catholic Connections, Circle of Voices and Mayor's Council Liaison Committee.

Geri Hall



Prior to her retirement in January 2018, Geri Hall had been an educator in Saskatchewan for 37 years, with the last 14 years spent with Holy Trinity Catholic Schools. Geri came to Holy Trinity in 2004, relocated to Moose Jaw as a Superintendent of Curriculum and Instruction in 2007, and became Director of Education in May 2014.

Geri's journey into Catholic Education began with her primary education in LeRoy followed by high school at St. Ursuline's Academy in Bruno, Saskatchewan. In 1976 Geri was a St. Thomas More student. After completing a BA at STM Geri went on to complete a Bachelor's and a Master's in education. She is the mother of three children (two sons and a daughter), with two sons having graduated from STM. Geri was awarded the St. Thomas More Distinguished Alumna Award in 2013.

Geri's provincial contributions were notable. She was part of the Saskatchewan Teachers Federation work and was selected by the Ministry of Education to work with the Saskatchewan Educational Leadership Unit to develop LEADS modules and deliver sessions. She was also part of the Provincial Leadership team working on the Education Sector Strategic Plan (ESSP) in Reading, Writing and Math.

Geri's Directorship spanned the early stages of the challenge of the Theodore court case. She was renowned for her cool under pressure, and her leadership at this time was appreciated by all eight Catholic Divisions in our province.

As a result of Geri's influence and leadership, Holy Trinity was ahead of the curve in many areas, but specifically in supporting emergent readers. Geri had a vision regarding the development of an effective reading intervention program and used data-based decision making to bring that vision to fruition.

As a mentor and role model, Geri inspired all employees within Holy Trinity to be the face of Christ to the students in their schools. She was the embodiment of our division theme, "Be Joyful in Hope" and was truly a servant leader.




Julian Paslawski Meritorious Service Award
