
The Clifton StrengthsFinder program developed by Dr. Donald O. Clifton of Gallup focuses on what’s strong not on what’s wrong. People who use their strengths every day are six times more likely to be engaged on the job (Gallup). When we are engaged, we are happier, more energetic, more productive in all that we do, and more ready to fully serve God and the world. Furthermore, we are more likely to have close relationships and greater social connection. These conditions, create a desire to go to work or school in employees and students. Schools that value trust and meaningful connections among teachers enjoy higher teacher retention rates, lower absenteeism and higher levels of student success. (Hodges, Gallup, 2018)

Throughout the 2017-18 school year, the Light of Christ Catholic Schools leadership team and Board of Education learned about their natural strengths by working with Clifton StrengthsFinder coach, Cory Rideout. How we naturally think, feel, and behave, and how we use these natural talents has been proven to create engaged and thriving schools. Now, in the 2018-19 school year, all LOCCS staff and high school students will learn to claim, name, and aim their strengths for the benefit of our peers, colleagues, schools, and community!

LOCCS Student Services teacher, Andrea Sparrow wrote the following reflection to remind students everywhere that they are strong, that there is hope, and that they matter:

God doesn’t make junk. It is as simple as that. Strength, gifts, talents... these are the things that God has given each and everyone of us. A strength, attributes that you have that allow you to do well in something. A gift is something that you give to others or something that is given to you. A talent is something you are good at or excel in. Each one of these words we use interchangeably.

In the Gospel of Mark, John tells Jesus that someone is performing miracles in your name and we tried to stop him! Jesus said do not stop them because anyone that does



something good in my name is with us and not against us. Jesus goes on to tell the apostles to use their strengths for love and they will be rewarded.

At school you are asked to think about your strengths, in job interviews you are asked what your strengths are. We as society look at a person's strengths but also their challenges or sometimes people call them their weaknesses or drawbacks. I actually feel that society focuses on a person's challenges more so than a person's strengths.

I often hear from students, "I can't, I'm not good at that, I suck, or I have no talents" Focused in the negative. Even in the media it brings peoples challenges to the fore front. However, like I said before God doesn't make junk. God knew our name and us before we were an idea or a yearning. God molded, shaped and sculpt each and every one of us in his image. He spent time developing each and every one of us and our STRENGTHS.
