"In the end we each become a story. As we capture the essence of our Catholic education journey, we remember through this holistic lens we put on our work!"



Our learning story is indeed a rich one. What makes it rich? How do we determine the value of story making and story sharing? Who are the one and the many?

Holy Family RCSSD #140, throughout the course of the 2019-20 school year, has embraced theme and engaged in the activities, events and reflections that make learning come to life. Translating these experiences into stories to share has only enhanced the enjoyment and learning for all.

At the outset of the year, the school-based administrators joined together with the academic administrators of the Holy Family central office to spend some time in a retreat setting to focus on the possibilities this theme might bring. Immediately, it was determined that we would continue to capture our stories in the journal which had been started in the last school year. Administrators would record, in the journal, a variety of stories which reflected student and staff development in the schools and division-wide. Almost immediately, it became evident that 'bookmarking' the stories would be desirable. That way, a reader could quickly revisit any one story. The team worked together to create bookmarks that displayed the values held by the Holy Family members – from the Board of Education to the littlest learner. In Holy Family, we value:

Although we aren't able to collaborate on our school story together in person, we are still encouraging our students and staff to branch off into new chapters of their own personal stories while they are at home. Every week, I post a series of activities to stay connected while keeping our distance. Each daily task requires some form of response which the parents and students will then share on our social media sites. It gives us a chance to communicate with one another and share our experiences with one another. Our story has not ended; I believe it has only begun!
