
A Message from Our Director of Education, Domenic Scuglia

The 2020 provincial budget included the announcement of a new joint-use elementary school to come in the area. Details on timelines and exact locations are still unknown, but we do know this is a need for the growing community.

First, he addressed the excitement of our school division for the École St. Pius X community as the school sees a new facility on the way. St. Pius will soon be part of a jointuse building with Argyle School. Construction will begin soon, with the new facility located at the current Argyle School location.





The second event Board Chair Bob Kowalchuk spoke at was to announce a fourth school becoming part of a previously announced rebuild. St. Michael Community School, St. Peter School, Imperial School and now also McDermid School will all be part of another joint-use elementary school. Location and other details are still unknown.
