

Introduction

The purpose of permeation is to make our faith part of every lesson we teach. It is the sharing of our core religious values with our students. We look for authentic ways to share our faith.

Permeating Faith Through Connections to Religion Class

Faith permeation can include making connections between current Religious Education programming and other subject areas. The *Growing in Faith, Growing in Christ* program is divided into five units over the course of the year, corresponding to the seasons of the Liturgical Year.

- Unit 1 Ordinary Time (September November)
- Unit 2 Advent and Christmas (December early January)
- Unit 3 Ordinary Time (January February)
 - o End of unit depends on when Lent begins
- Unit 4 Lent and Easter (approximately mid-February through late March)
 - o Start and end date depend on when Lent begins and Easter is celebrated
- Unit 5 Easter Season and Ordinary Time (April June)
 - o Start date depends on when Easter is celebrated

Grade 8 Religion Outcomes

This short summary outlines what students will be learning in Religious Education programming over the course of the year.

Unit 1 – The Holy Spirit Guides in Seeking Truth and Acting Justly.

Explore how the Holy Spirit, Scripture, and the Church can help form our conscience and guide moral decision making.

Unit 2 – The Church is United as a Community of Faith.

Examine how the Nicene Creed unites all Catholics, and how the Church's liturgical seasons reveal the mysteries of faith that we profess in the Creed.

Unit 3 – The Holy Spirit Guides the Mission of the Church and Its People.

Examine how the Holy Spirit works through the sacraments of initiation by calling as well as equipping us, and that through the sacrament of Confirmation we are sent forward to support the Church's mission.

Unit 4 – Lent and Easter Reveal Jesus' Mission and the Role of the Holy Spirit in Our Lives.

Explore how Jesus revealed His mission to bring us salvation through His ministry and how He modeled ways we can experience the presence of the Holy Spirit.

Unit 5 – The Holy Spirit Enriches Us to Model and Share the Kingdom of God.

Explore how the Holy Spirit supports us to continue Jesus' mission to share God's love and plan of salvation with all people.

Grade 8 Religion Outcomes – Unit One

Outcome 8.1 Explore how the Holy Spirit guides us to seek truth and act justly.

Overview of Unit 1:

We begin the school year in the midst of Ordinary Time, which occurs outside the major liturgical seasons of Advent, Christmas, Lent, and Easter. This time of growth is reflected in the colour green adorning our churches and our classroom Prayer Tables.

During this unit, students will explore the question: How does the Holy Spirit guide us to seek truth and act justly? They will learn about how Jesus connects all Scripture, the formation of the Gospels, the four senses of Scripture, how the Beatitudes can help us lead morally good lives, and how Scripture encourages us to serve the common good. Students will also explore how the Holy Spirit, Scripture, and the Church can help form our conscience and guide moral decision making. They will learn to apply a moral decision making model to both everyday dilemmas and larger, global issues. Throughout their learning, students will deepen their understanding of how the Holy Spirit teaches and guides us as we respond to God's call to seek truth and act justly. Students will have moments to pray and reflect through vocal prayer and meditations with Scripture.

Although students will journey together through this first unit, it will also be a journey of self-discovery. There will be opportunities for personal reflection to help students discern how they learn about, connect with, and build their relationship with God in their daily experiences.

Overview of Unit 2:

Unit 2 takes place during the liturgical seasons of Advent, Christmas, and Epiphany. As we contemplate God's Word becoming flesh, we reflect on the presence of the Holy Trinity in the world, our Church, and our lives. When we profess the Nicene Creed during the holiday season, we remember that we are all united by our faith in the promise of salvation through Christ. Whether we belong to a Latin or Eastern Catholic Church, our faith is the same. All of our celebrations draw us together as a community and reflect the central mysteries of our faith.

During this unit, students will explore the question: How is our Church united as a community of faith? They will look at the foundations of the Universal Church and how we are united by our faith, in diversity, and through prayer. Students examine how the Nicene Creed unites all Catholics, and how the Church's liturgical seasons reveal the mysteries of faith that we profess in the Creed. Students also explore how the diff erent celebrations within the Universal Church reveal the truths of our faith and bring us together as a community. They examine their responsibilities as members of the Church community and consider how prayer is an essential element of participating in our faith.

Grade 8 Religion Outcomes – Unit Three

Outcome 8.3 Examine how the Holy Spirit guides the mission of the Church and its people.

- how receiving the sacrament of the Eucharist brings us fully into the Church
- how the Church supports us in living a holy life and helps us be witnesses to the life modelled by Jesus
- how the Holy Spirit inspires the Church and its members in living holy lives

Overview of Unit 3:

Unit 3 coincides with the beginning of the calendar year and marks the beginning of Ordinary Time on the liturgical calendar. During this time period, which follows the Feast of the Baptism of Our Lord, the liturgical vestments and altar cloths return to green.

During this unit, students will explore the question: How does the Holy Spirit guide the mission of the Church and its people? Through their study of Sacred Scripture and Sacred Tradition, students will better understand why we believe in the Trinity and how we discern the Trinity's divine mission. Students will learn how the Holy Spirit works through the sacraments of initiation by calling as well as equipping us, and that through the sacrament of Confirmation we are sent forward to support the Church's mission. Students will be introduced to saints and holy people who were guided by the Holy Spirit and lived to support this mission of the Church. In addition, students will develop their understanding of the four marks of the Church and learn how we are nourished as one Christian community through our participation in the Mass and the celebration of the Eucharist.

Throughout the unit, students will have many opportunities to pray and reflect on their personal faith journeys through vocal prayer, meditations with Scripture, and moments of contemplation. In addition to working together as a class to explore how the Holy Spirit guides the mission of the Church, opportunities for personal reflection will help students discern how they are personally called, anointed, equipped, and sent by God in their mission as members of the Church.

Overview of Unit 4:

Unit 4 takes place during the liturgical seasons of Lent and Easter. Students focus on Jesus' role in the plan for our salvation and how the Holy Spirit guides us as we continue His mission and strive for the kingdom of God. They will deepen their understanding of what Jesus' life, ministry, and sacrifice mean to us, as well as the role of the Holy Spirit in Jesus' mission and ours.

During this unit, students will explore the question: How do Lent and Easter reveal Jesus' mission and the role of the Holy Spirit in our lives? They will look at how Jesus revealed His mission to bring us salvation through His ministry, including explaining Scripture in the Old Testament and teaching us how to pray with our words and actions. Students examine Jesus' temptations to see how He models the ways we can resist self-indulgence, despair, and pride, as well as how the pillars of Lent help strengthen us and turn us back to God when we are tempted. They explore how Jesus, during His time on Earth, modelled ways we can experience the presence of the Holy Spirit. They also examine how Jesus sent the Holy Spirit to guide His followers after His death, resurrection, and ascension. Students look at the example of how the Holy Spirit worked through the Apostles to transform people in Jesus' name, and they examine how the Holy Spirit also works within us during our ongoing conversion of heart.

Overview of Unit 5:

Unit 5 begins after Easter Sunday and proceeds through the remainder of the Easter season and into Ordinary Time. At this time the vestments will return to the colour green. The weeks are numbered using ordinals such as the Fourth and Fourteenth Sunday; not because it is unimportant or ordinary. Ordinary Time is the time of the year in which we meditate on Jesus' activity among us, healing, teaching, and restoring people to new life.

During this unit, students will explore the question: How does the Holy Spirit enrich us to model and share the kingdom of God? Students will explore how the Holy Spirit supports us to continue Jesus' mission to share God's love and plan of salvation with all people. They will focus on the importance of their faith and relationship with the three Persons of the Trinity as they learn how to witness to Jesus to spread the Good News. In this learning, students will deepen their understanding of how the Holy Spirit helps us live holy lives to evangelize in every sector of life.

Throughout the unit, students will have opportunities to pray and reflect on their personal faith journey through vocal prayer, meditations with Scripture, and moments of contemplation. In addition to working together as a class to explore their mission to evangelize, opportunities for personal reflection will help students discern how they learn about, connect with, and build their relationship with God in their daily experiences.
